VINTAGE 2023 REPORT

Bordeaux's 2023 vintage is a fascinating paradox. While the year was one of the warmest in recorded history, it wasn't very sunny—in contrast with recent warm vintages such as 2022, 2020, 2019 and 2018. Between May and September, the growing season was dry; yet 2023 was also defined agronomically, as it was in the media, by periods of intense rainfall. And if recent warm growing seasons have tended to begin early and finish early, though 2023 may have begun with an early budbreak, the time between flowering and harvest was entirely classic, permitting leisurely hang time.

The young wines, tasted from cask, reflect this paradox, possessing—at their best—the depth, density and ripe tannin of a sunny vintage but also the vibrant, expressive aromas and flavors of a more traditionally “Atlantic” season. The best 2023s are just as exciting as the best 2022s, even if the vintage is more varied in quality and style; yet the final paradox is that, due to a cool global economy and two consecutive lukewarm en primeur campaigns, the 2023s may be released at prices as interesting as any we have seen since 2019.

From August 16, Bordeaux experienced a heat wave that entirely changed the profile of the vintage. In recent years, excess temperatures and intense sunlight have been challenges to be mitigated; but in 2023, for once, they were a boon to be seized, delivering mid-palate plenitude and potential for full phenolic maturity that would otherwise have been unattainable.

So far, I have tasted more than 900 barrel samples of 2023 Bordeaux with my team over the last 10 days in the region, and the best reds show balance and freshness with deep center palates of ripe fruit and a complement of polished tannins. In many ways, I like them better than many of the highly touted 2022s because they are so Bordeaux in their nature with their tensioned mouthfeels and energetic finishes. Many 2022s are very powerful and rich, highlighting the extremely hot and dry grape-growing conditions of the vintage. Some are almost international in their essence.

Tasting hundreds of young wines highlights that the vintage was not an across-the-board home run for all appellations or wineries. Smaller wine estates in lesser-known regions seemed to struggle to make really outstanding wines, but they are just a small step down in quality compared with 2022 due to less density of fruit and structure as well as length. Top terroirs and top winemakers delivered terrific-quality wines, but they are different than 2022. I would compare these 2023s to 2019 or 2001 – even 1990 – for their freshness and balance of ripe fruit. Dry whites are excellent quality in 2023 and perhaps better than 2022 in many instances but I have not evaluated some star whites, such as Haut-Brion and La Mission. Sauternes and Barsac appear to have made outstanding sweet wines again.

To my taste, some of the 2023 reds have remarkable structure because of their lower alcohols – up to one degree alcohol less than 2022 – and vibrant acidities. Some of my favorite wines, so far, have pHs of 3.5 or even less, making them some of the brightest and liveliest red Bordeaux I have tasted in years. Names like Canon, Pavie and Pavie-Macquin take structure and intensity to another level thanks to their limestone-rich terroirs. Pavie is clearly making a shift in style.

I think a few vintages of the past and present compare to 2023, such as 2019 or 2016 and something older like 2001 or 1996 or 1995. They all had ripe, balanced fruit and firm tannins with slightly lower alcohol and lower pH (strength of acidity) compared with hotter years. But 2023 is different not only because of its special growing season but also the advancements in viticulture and winemaking over the last decade. The top Bordeaux viticulturalist and winemakers are much more precise and thoughtful than in the past.

The 2023 vintage swerved from one episode to another as if Mother Nature was making it up as she went along. There was rain, mildew pressure, cool inclement spells and a sudden heatwave that dovetailed into a second summer. The year kicked off in January with wintry spells that extended into the next month. Early bud break was due to a combination of high sunlight hours in February (168 hours compared to a 1981-2010 average of 115) and a particularly warm March that reached over 16°C, a hallmark of several recent vintages. Vines switched on their ignitions early to winemakers' consternation and were left on tenterhooks until midMay, fearing a spring frost.

June is earning a reputation as a 'wet' month. It saw an average of 83mm of rain: a series of thunderstorms barreled their way across the region and created perfect conditions for one of the year's headlines - mildew. Undeniably, there was variation. The intensity of mildew pressure varied according to dryness per micro-climate, amount of rainfall/humidity and soil type (compacted soil potentially leading to more surface water and increased humidity), type of rootstock and vine age.

Compared to 2022's temperatures of 23.4°C and 24.1°C in July and August, as previously mentioned, vines did not have to cope with torrid heat. However, it came after a period of inclement weather. So, unlike in 2022, when vines could acclimatize, in 2023, two heat waves from August 18 to 24 and September 3 to 10 (the dates vary slightly between winemakers!) came as a jolt, especially for younger vines as temperatures soared to 38°C. Consequently, despite average lower temperatures, vines could still shut down, and I feel that it was more prevalent than some winemakers admit. July was dry with 22mm of rain, which is above last year's paltry figure of 3mm, but importantly, it was unseasonably cloudy with fewer sunlight hours (230) than average. August's rainfall was just below the mean.

Average temperatures in September were a balmy 21.3°C, way above the tenyear average of 18.5°C.

It's a healthy crop rather than a bumper. Official figures for AC Bordeaux show that the harvest was 3.84 million liters, which is 13% above 2022, though, within the context of the last decade, it is the third 'small' vintage in a row.

Generally, the 2023s are relatively more tannic than we've become accustomed to, more linear and vertical, though endowed with greater fruit concentration than the 2021s. That appeals to my predilection. The best wines embrace these traits while maintaining sufficient fruit and grip.

Wines Advocate	The 2023 Montrose is another brilliant wine from an estate that's now routinely among Bordeaux's very best, year in, year out. A blend of 75% Cabernet Sauvignon, 21% Merlot and 4% Cabernet Sauvignon, derived exclusively from the estate's historic core on the fourth terrace situated just in front of the château itself, it unwinds in the glass with aromas of cassis and wild berries mingled with notions of lilac, violet and pencil shavings. Full-bodied, deep and layered, with a textural attack that segues into a dense, multidimensional mid-palate framed by beautifully ripe tannins and lively acids, it concludes with a long, resonant finish. It will be worth a special effort to seek out.

James Suckling	Wow. This is the essence of Montrose, with blackberry, blackcurrant, crushed stone and earth. I have not tasted a Montrose like this in 42 years of my career. It has a much more vertical nature to it, with layered tannins that go very deep and long, The muscular structure and intensity is something else. This is a new era for Montrose. It is now made from only 45 hectares of vineyards right in front of the chateau, instead of about 60 before. 75% cabernet sauvignon, 21% merlot and 4% cabernet franc.

Vinous	The 2023 Montrose is focused on the original terroir of the estate, known as Terrace 4, located in front of the river. It comprises 45 hectares, around 12 to 15 hectares less than previous vintages so as to capture the expression of Montrose classified in 1855. Picked from September 5 to 28 and matured in 60% new oak, this has a very intense and focused bouquet: pure black fruit with just a touch of strawberry, hints of violet petals developing in the glass. The palate is medium-bodied with fine-boned tannins—very pure, with pitch-perfect acidity. This gains depth toward the finish but maintains a sense of linearity that ensures it is one of the vintage's finest contributions from the Left Bank. Magnificent.

It's a blend of 61% Merlot, 32% Cabernet Sauvignon, 5% Petit Verdot and 2% Cabernet Franc.

Wafting from the glass with deep aromas of cassis, wild berries, orange zest and exotic spices, framed by well-integrated new wood, it's medium to full-bodied, deep and layered, with a concentrated core of fruit, beautifully suave tannins and a cool, seamless profile. It's a blend of 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, 33% Merlot and the balance Cabernet Franc and Petit Verdot that attained 12.9% alcohol and is being matured in 50% new oak.

Wines Advocate	Aromas of crème de cassis and dark berries mingled with pencil shaving, espresso roast and violets introduce the 2023 Mouton Rothschild, a medium to full-bodied, layered and fleshy wine with a creamy core of ripe but lively fruit, sweet tannins and an expansive finish. In terms of parcels, the 2023 is quite different in origins from the 2022, favoring plots that are better-drained rather than those resistant to drought. It's a blend of 93% Cabernet Sauvignon and 7% Merlot, without either Cabernet Franc or Petit Verdot featuring in the blend, and it attained 13.3% alcohol.
